






















































Message From the Board Chair

- Business Advising: Unlimited, 1-to-1 business advice, free with a WESK membership.
- Financing: Up to \$150,000 available to majority woman-owned Saskatchewan businesses. Additional financing of up to \$50,000 through Women's Enterprise Organizations of Canada (WEOC).
- Expert Access: WESK develops relationships with support organizations who offer their services to WESK members free of charge. Our Expert Access partners include legal, financial, marketing and HR.
- WESK Support for Newcomers: This year we began to adapt the type of support we offered to Newcomer
 Women to start and gain momentum in their
 Saskatchewan-based businesses.
- Rural Ambassador Program: WESK Ambassadors allow us to reach new regions of the province and provide support on a truly provincial scale.

- Peer Mentor Groups: A partnership with WeBC allowed us to offer three Peer Mentoring Groups to a total of 24 WESK members at various stages of business.
- Workshops and Webinars: WESK's webinars and workshops offer targeted training on essential business topics such as financial management, marketing strategies, and leadership skills, tailored to meet the unique needs of women entrepreneurs.
- WESK Summit & Gala: WESK's annual entrepreneurship conference and celebration of the achievements of women entrepreneurs.
- WESK Connect: Our newly created monthly networking event that provides opportunities for entrepreneurs and business people to connect.

Membership

WESK was founded 30 years ago with six members. Since then, our organization has grown to 897 members, each of whom are making an impact on the Saskatchewan economy. Our membership is diverse, with members located all over our province in a variety of industries and stages of business. Diversity is one of our core values as an organization, and we aim to be as inclusive as possible.

FROM DREAM TO REALITY: WREN'S STORY

Starting a business during an economic recession is not for the faint of heart—but when passion meets the right support, dreams can take flight.

In 2024, I opened the doors to Wren, a boutique rooted in home, lifestyle, and wellness. What began as a vision of creating a warm, intentional space offering beautiful, natural goods quickly became a full-fledged venture thanks in large part to the unwavering support of the team at WESK.

Like many entrepreneurs, I was navigating uncertainty. Launching a brick-and-mortar storefront during a time when small businesses were facing steep challenges often felt overwhelming. There were moments when things slowed down significantly, when income plateaued, and the future felt foggy. But through it all, I never felt alone.

My WESK Business Advisor, Alauna Whelan, was a grounding force. Her insight, encouragement, and practical guidance helped me move through roadblocks and lean into creative solutions. She helped me see the bigger picture when I was bogged down in day-to-day stresses, and reminded me that success isn't always linear—but it's always possible.

The entire WESK team made a profound impact. They believed in me, and in the heart behind Wren. Whether it was strategic advice, emotional support, or simply having someone to turn to when doubt crept in, WESK was therereminding me that I could do this.

Today, Wren is more than just a shop; it's a reflection of resilience, community, and what can happen when women support women. I'm proud of how far we've come, and deeply grateful to WESK for walking alongside me through it all.





Advising Support

As an organization, WESK is here to support women at all stages of business, from idea, startup, to growth and scale, and succession planning. WESK understands the gender-based barriers women entrepreneurs face. Women need support navigating the inevitable challenges that come with owning and operating a business. Our advisors assist clients on their unique business journeys. Members are quick to tell us about the impact of having someone take the time to understand their business goals and challenges, support them in creating a business plan, or help them take the next step toward their vision.

EXPERT ACCESS

The Expert Access Program is an exclusive opportunity for WESK Members to connect with professionals in Saskatchewan at no cost. The WESK roster of experts includes those in marketing, legal, accounting, and human resource industries. This high-impact, low-barrier service provides tailored support for women, whether they are starting, growing, or scaling a business. The Expert Access Program has been running since 2018, and we owe it all to our partners and specialized experts. Your generous support to this program helps to fill in the gaps for women running small businesses across the province.















Training

Learning never stops for an entrepreneur. This year, WESK conducted more than 69 webinars, peer mentorship groups, and workshops, with a combined total of 814 participants. The highest number of attendees was observed in July and April, where we covered the topics "Bookkeeping Tips and Tricks" and "Priced for Profit", respectively. In September, our Summit covered various topics and hosted a total of 180 participants.

Additionally, we had a total of 5,992 on-demand participants who accessed WESK Learn and WESK Resources content throughout the year. We are proud of the diversity of topics and focus areas we covered this year, and we look forward to continuing these webinar series into the coming year.

Financing

A key finding of the Saskatchewan Advisory Committee on the Gender Entrepreneurship Gap was that women are less likely to secure capital than men.

WESK understands how hard business capital can be to access – particularly for women – and our WESK

Financing Fund aims to address this gap with loans of up to \$150,000. We are thrilled to continue the legacy of financial support for women entrepreneurs, and this year we funded several new loans through the WESK Financing Fund. WESK also partners with WEOC to offer an additional \$50,000 of financing. Interest paid from your loan goes back into our financing fund, which helps us provide even more loans to women entrepreneurs.

WEOC LOAN FUND

In 2024-2025, we processed 6 loans through WEOC for a total of \$230,000.

Highlights

SEPTEMBER 2024

WESK Summit & AGM 2024: We gathered 175 women entrepreneurs and WESK supporters for a day of learning and networking. In addition, we hosted the WESK AGM during the lunch hour to spread additional awareness of WESK's successes.

NOVEMBER 2024

Procure with Her 2024: We brought together procurement professionals and women entrepreneurs for a day of networking. Held on November 19th, the event advanced the Women Entrepreneurship Charter by championing supplier diversity and showcasing the talent of Saskatchewan women-owned businesses.

Charter Champion Revitalization: We launched our project to re-engage existing signatories and attract new Champions committed to advancing women entrepreneurs. This refreshed approach builds momentum for stronger, measurable action under the Women Entrepreneurship Charter.

APRIL 2024

Rural Ambassador Program: In partnership with the Saskatchewan government, we were able to secure our first five rural ambassadors and begin hosting our Rural WESK Connect events.

MAY 2024

WESK Gala 2024: We hosted nearly 300 people at our annual WESK Gala for an evening of celebration and connection at the Sheraton Cavalier in Saskatoon.

OCTOBER 2024

Launch of Updates to WESK Connect: We reviewed last year's successes and opportunities and made some strategic changes to the way that we gather our network.

MARCH 2025

Launch of Redesigned WESK.ca: We launched a refreshed, user-friendly website in March 2025, making it easier for women entrepreneurs to navigate services, programs, and events. The new site reflects WESK's bold and modern brand direction.

Launch of Updated Visual Identity: WESK introduced a new visual identity in 2025 that better reflects the energy, ambition, and diversity of the entrepreneurs we serve. The refreshed look strengthens our presence across digital and print platforms.

Launch of Refreshed Membership Structure: Our updated membership model launched in March 2025 to better align with the needs of women at different stages of business. With simplified tiers and enhanced benefits, we're delivering greater value to our members.

Advocacy

This has been a monumental year for WESK's advocacy work for women entrepreneurs in Saskatchewan. WESK focused its energy on the following efforts for the 2024/2025 fiscal year:



GOVERNMENT RELATIONS

WESK has engaged in various meetings, conversations, and events with government at various levels. Meeting with provincial political leaders through the Saskatchewan Business Council and our MLA Meet & Greet, which we try to host annually, gives WESK the opportunity to advocate in the most important spaces. We will continue to work closely with government officials and policymakers to promote policies and regulations that benefit women entrepreneurs. Our hope is that these government officials and policymakers may lobby for changes in laws, regulations, or funding programs that create a more favourable business environment for women-owned businesses.



RESEARCH AND DATA

By polling our membership and general network, we are able to better identify gaps in the ecosystem and in our province as a whole. This research will support in creating a better strategy for advocacy. This research can be used to influence decision-makers and provide evidence for the need for specific policies or programs. In addition, this data influences and guides our proposals to various groups for program funding.

AWARENESS CAMPAIGNS



WESK has been able to leverage its platforms and partnerships to raise public awareness about the contributions and challenges faced by women entrepreneurs throughout the province. Currently, these efforts include social media, radio and television interviews, and some minimal paid media efforts.

NETWORKING AND COLLABORATION



Using our events and large network, we can foster collaborations and partnerships with other organizations, both within and outside the entrepreneurial ecosystem. By collaborating with other stakeholders, WESK can amplify advocacy efforts and achieve a greater impact. WESK was able to do so through our events, like WESK Connect, WESK Summit and Gala, and other networking events.

SUPPLIER DIVERSITY



Through the evolution of Procure With Her and the revitalization of the Women Entrepreneurship Charter, WESK has actively advocated for more inclusive procurement practices in Saskatchewan. By connecting women entrepreneurs with procurement professionals and raising awareness of supplier diversity, WESK is pushing for systemic change in how contracts are awarded and who has access to them.

Women-Owned **Business Database**

WESK continued growing a movement to help Saskatchewan entrepreneurs identify themselves as a local women-owned/led business. Businesses that partake receive access to the "Women-Owned Saskatchewan Business" logo, are added to our women-owned database, and can be featured across WESK's social channels.

Whether you're looking to diversify your supply chain, find a new board candidate, or simply support a local woman entrepreneur, look no further!

As of March 31, 2025, nearly 800 women-owned businesses have joined the movement.

Modernization

From 2024-2025, WESK undertook a series of modernization projects to better serve and advocate for women entrepreneurs. We launched a refreshed, user-friendly website that makes it easier to access services, programs, and events, while also showcasing our bold new direction. This was supported by an updated visual identity that reflects the energy, ambition, and diversity of our community across all platforms.

We also introduced a simplified membership model with clearer tiers and enhanced benefits tailored to different stages of business. These updates ensure that our members can easily identify the right fit and access more value through their WESK experience. Together, these changes strengthen our ability to support women entrepreneurs across Saskatchewan.



Procure with Her

In November 2024, WESK hosted its annual Procure With Her event at the Alt Hotel in Saskatoon, gathering over 100 attendees from across the province. Rooted in the Women Entrepreneurship Charter, the event addressed one of the Charter's four pillars—procurement by creating space for women-owned businesses and procurement professionals to build relationships, share experiences, and explore new contracting opportunities.

The day featured educational presentations, a panel, facilitated breakout discussions, and over 60 women entrepreneurs pitching during structured speed networking rounds. Funded by WAGE and SaskPower, the event continues to be a flagship initiative to increase procurement from womenowned Saskatchewan businesses and reduce barriers to scaling through supplier diversity and inclusive purchasing practices.



Charter Champions

The Saskatchewan Women Entrepreneurship Charter, launched by WESK to address the province's gender entrepreneurship gap, continues to grow as a leading initiative to support women-owned businesses. Grounded in four core principles, the Charter provides actionable guidance to help organizations increase their support of local women entrepreneurs through visibility, opportunity, and inclusion.

By March 31, 2025, WESK had engaged 72 Charter Champions—a diverse group of public and private sector leaders across Saskatchewan committed to advancing women's economic participation.

This year marked a significant turning point for the initiative. With new funding support from Women and Gender Equality Canada (WAGE), WESK implemented a formal engagement strategy that included:

- Reintroduction meetings with current Champions
- Updated resources, including a new Charter overview guide and onboarding slide deck
- A measurable support model for tracking progress and impact
- The launch of Procure With Her, a procurementfocused event connecting women-owned businesses with public sector buyers
- Advisory and Mastermind Committees to support the updated approach to Charter Champion tactics

The Charter's renewed focus on education, procurement readiness, and long-term ecosystem impact has laid the groundwork for deeper collaboration and accountability in the year ahead.

Newcomer Program

Following its launch in January 2024, the WESK Support for Newcomers program entered its first full year of implementation in 2024-2025. This initiative focuses on identifying and addressing the unique needs of newcomer women as they start or grow their entrepreneurial journeys in Saskatchewan.

Building on insights, WESK refined its approach and introduced a structured cohort model at the start of 2025, which increased accessibility and impact through consistent small-group learning environments. Most participants in the program were balancing caregiving responsibilities and either operating a business or actively preparing to launch - highlighting the importance of a model that meets them where they are. Key enhancements in 2024–2025 included:

- Expanded collaboration with newcomer-serving organizations
- Virtual orientation calls allowed for province-wide reach and updated onboarding ensured newcomers felt welcomed and supported.
- 67% of participants were already operating or preparing to launch their business, affirming the importance of early-stage support and validation.

Looking ahead, WESK will continue to build on this foundation with tailored workshops, peer support groups, and regional delivery through partner organizations. These efforts reflect WESK's commitment to creating an inclusive entrepreneurial ecosystem and supporting newcomer women as valuable contributors to Saskatchewan's economy.

Rural Ambassador Program

The 2024–2025 fiscal year marked the first full year of the WESK Brand Ambassador Program—a strategic initiative designed to expand WESK's visibility and deepen connections in rural Saskatchewan. With five Ambassadors representing regions across the province, the program focused on storytelling, relationshipbuilding, and amplifying the unique realities of rural entrepreneurship.

Ambassadors served as community connectors, identifying local challenges and opportunities, while actively showcasing women-owned businesses in their regions. Throughout the year, WESK saw a 41% year-over-year increase in Business Advisor requests from Rural areas, demonstrating both the demand for regionally tailored engagement and the growing awareness of the program.

Key activities in the first year included:

 The WESK Road Trip, where WESK staff met with entrepreneurs in the Southwest part of the province in their communities to foster deeper collaboration and shared insight

- A Virtual Spotlight Series, featuring rural women entrepreneurs across WESK's social media channels, which helped expand visibility and foster a sense of pride in rural business ownership
- Strategic referrals and collaborations contributed to a growth in membership of agriculture and foodrelated businesses, rising form 3% to 11% of WESK members.

 - Women In Ag., November 7-8, 2024
 - Three Points Impact Awards Breakthrough Business, November 21, 2024
 - Celebrating Rural Ranch Woman, February 6-7, 2025

Through this grassroots-led model, WESK has begun to reframe how rural entrepreneurship is understood and supported. The Brand Ambassador Program has proven to be a critical channel for building authentic relationships, sharing real stories, and ensuring women entrepreneurs across all corners of Saskatchewan are seen, supported, and celebrated.

WESK Connect

Now in its second season, WESK Connect continues to bring together women leaders, entrepreneurs, and industry experts for authentic conversations, relationship-building, and knowledge sharing. Taking place monthly from October to April, events were hosted on the second Wednesday in Saskatoon at The Avenue Room and the third Wednesday in Regina at The Everyday Kitchen. Each evening offers a welcoming atmosphere, complete with refreshments, to encourage meaningful connections.

This year, we introduced three dynamic event formats: Candid Conversations, Networking with Industry Experts, and Open Mic Pitch Night, each held twice in both cities. Candid Conversations paired an inspiring woman entrepreneur with a woman leader host, creating space for honest dialogue and audience Q&A. Networking with Industry Experts connected attendees with professionals in fields such as marketing, legal, finance, and international trade, fostering strategic business relationships. Open Mic Pitch Night invited women entrepreneurs to practice and refine their business pitches, promote their ideas, and receive feedback in a supportive environment.
















Rural WESK Connect

The 2024-2025 season marked the first year of WESK's Rural Ambassador Program, an initiative designed to increase WESK's presence and support in rural communities across Saskatchewan. Five dedicated Rural Ambassadors were selected to represent their regions, host events, and champion women entrepreneurs in their local business ecosystems.

Unlike the urban WESK Connect series, the rural events focused primarily on community-building and candid peer conversation. These 2-hour sessions provided a welcoming space for rural women entrepreneurs to connect over shared experiences, explore the unique opportunities and challenges of operating a business in a rural area, and discuss strategies to overcome limiting beliefs about what's possible outside major centres.

While each event varied based on community needs and Ambassador input, themes of visibility, mindset, and opportunity were consistent throughout. Many Ambassadors hosted more than one gathering, demonstrating strong local engagement and demand.
