


- The July 2019 announcement by Minister Goodale, on behalf of the Government of Canada, of \$1.56 million to launch a new program (The Exchange) to scale up growth-oriented women-led businesses.
- The September 2019 launch of the work of the Saskatchewan Advisory Committee to advise on actionable strategies to close the gap;

It has been an incredible honour to serve as board chair this year alongside a group of incredible directors who continue to work hard to set a strategic direction for WESK which will result in closing the gap. Message from the CEO



Vision

All Saskatchewan entrepreneurs have an equal opportunity to achieve success and recognition.

Women entrepreneurs contributed \$148 billion to our national GDP in 2012, and \$23.1 billion to our local Saskatchewan economy in 2019. We have the potential to increase Canada's GDP by \$150 to \$420 billion by 2026 through advancing gender equality in the creation of economic activity.

Supporting women entrepreneurship is not only a gender equity issue, it's also an economic policy issue.

Did you know that women entrepreneurs are starting businesses at a greater rate than their male counterparts? Unfortunately, they are not achieving scale to the same extent, despite expressing growth intentions that are on par or above men-led businesses.

This discrepancy is what creates the gender entrepreneurship gap and the ensuing gender economic gap. You are probably wondering – why does this gap exist?

Women entrepreneurs encounter unique barriers, such as access to financing, networks, and mentors. To put it simply, women are lacking the financial and human capital needed to be successful. By understanding and addressing these barriers, we can enhance opportunities to scale businesses and boost economic growth in our province.

As I've said before, we did not want to talk, but act. WESK is walking the talk.

 In May 2019, the Honourable Tina Beaudry-Mellor announced the creation of a WESK-led Saskatchewan Advisory Committee to examine and address the gender entrepreneurship gap in our province. The committee commenced in September 2019 and will conclude in June 2020 with a report of final recommendations.



- In partnership with Economic Development Regina, WESK launched and completed the first cohort of Founders Table, a Women in Tech mastermind group helping female entrepreneurs take their tech business and management skills to the next level.
- We delivered on our promise to help women not only start but also to grow and scale their businesses. We began recruitment for The Exchange, a business program developed to drive profitability for established female entrepreneurs.

Lives were altered almost overnight in our province, our country, and globally as we began to comprehend the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. Programs such as The Exchange were paused as WESK shifted focus from supporting women to scale their businesses to helping our stakeholders survive the crisis and navigate a path towards economic recovery.

Saskatchewan can lead the nation. We must seize the opportunity to close the gap and boost economic growth. Investing in women entrepreneurs isn't just the right thing to do, it is the smart thing to do.

The twelve-member committee's work in understanding and addressing the unique barriers that women entrepreneurs encounter will advance opportunities to scale businesses and boost economic growth.

The Committee members met five times from September 2019 to March 2020 to adjust sub-committee work in three pillars: enabling access to capital, influencing policy, and creating awareness.

The Exchange



In May 2019, WESK was awarded \$1.56 million to develop a new program to scale up growth-oriented women-led businesses. This program was made possible through funding received from the Government of Canada as part of the creation of the Women Entrepreneurship Fund and Women Entrepreneurship Strategy Ecosystem Fund.

Given the impact of the pandemic on small businesses in Saskatchewan, WESK has pivoted The Exchange to be responsive and relevant to the needs emerging from the current environment.



Introducing The Exchange: Rebound Edition

While remaining a three-year program, the first year will focus on economic recovery of businesses and ensuring women entrepreneurs have the tools and peer support to survive and rebound.

The Exchange will be launched on July 22, 2020 by bringing all applicants together for a virtual retreat to hear from reputable entrepreneurs in Saskatchewan who will provide guidance on working together to get through these difficult and unknown times.

In September 2020, applicants will be grouped into cohorts with other peers who own businesses with a similar number of employees and who encounter similar challenges. These cohorts will be led by a Chair and will meet monthly to discuss recovery, rebound and sustainability strategies.

Recruitment sessions were held in both Regina and Saskatoon, resulting in the initial group of applications from entrepreneurs to be a part of program.



In 2019, The Exchange project team worked diligently on the format, content, topics, and selection of guest experts and participant recruitment, to create a business program that would help drive profitability for female entrepreneurs.

May 2020

The Exchange was to launch in May 2020 but due to COVID-19, the launch date was postponed.

July 2020

This redesigned program will launch virtually in July 2020.

Connecting Women in Technology



WESK is proud to have launched Founders Table, a female-focused program for tech company founders. Funded by Innovation Saskatchewan and in partnership with Economic Development Regina, the group was facilitated by Katrina German and gained skills from various experts in the industry.



66 As a non-tech CEO, being able to be surrounded by other tech founders was attractive. I was on my own and this was an opportunity to learn from other CEOs. "



One of the most successful sessions was bringing together six investors from Saskatchewan in a "speed-networking" event.



We were also joined by Minister Tina Beaudry-Mellor, Minister of Advanced Education, Minister responsible for Innovation Saskatchewan, and Minister responsible for the Status of Women Office, for one of the sessions.

This was a completely unique experience, and to have a female founders group in Saskatchewan was incredible. You will see the ripples from this for years



Some of the milestones reached due to Founders Table include:

- 100% of the founders changed their product due to the knowledge they gained.
- 80% of the founders are employing more people than when they started.
- 100% of the founders feel more confident as a technology company leader.
- 70% of the founders are having ongoing angel/venture capital funding conversations directly from the speed networking session.
- 60% of the companies are in conversations or have received funding from NRC-IRAP.
- **80%** report being far clearer on their product marketing.

The women developed relationships that will be maintained through the next few years of technology development.



WESK Program

Matchstick



The Matchstick initiative was introduced to WESK's programming in 2017-2018 to support Indigenous women entrepreneurs with culturally relevant business training, advising, and financing.

In 2019-2020, Matchstick fostered the entrepreneurial journey reaching over 300 Indigenous women through business planning workshops and mentoring circles. Entrepreneurs in the communities of North Battleford, Prince Albert, Onion Lake Cree Nation, Regina, Saskatoon, Fort Qu'Appelle, and Yorkton learned about the components of a business plan. Mentoring circles in Saskatoon and Regina offered additional assistance and support in the business areas of financing, micro-loans, and individualized business advising. The format of a mentoring circle cultivated increased business knowledge, skills and confidence in leadership abilities.

Roundtables were held in four communities with 32 Indigenous women attending to identify the barriers, concerns, supports and gaps in the entrepreneurial ecosystem.

In 2019

- 31 business planning training sessions with 301 participants
- 9 mentoring circle sessions in Saskatoon and Regina with 49 participants
- 4 Indigenous women trained as facilitators
- 51 Matchstick membership were provided for Indigenous women to access Matchstick and WESK business advisory, loans and mentoring services
- 46 business advisory appointments provided by Indigenous women business owners
- 3 Matchstick loans disbursed






Women entrepreneurs realize quickly that there is more work to do than there are hours in the day! The same goes for learning all the aspects of operating a business.

- 3. Allowing participants to work on their business plan during the workshop
